

Most CIOs report worker shortages

Is there a shortage of IT specialists (generally comprising the GS-2210 management series or equivalent job titles) at your department, agency or bureau?




Nearly half cite 5 to 9 percent vacancy rate

If you have a shortage, what is your approximate job vacancy rate?




Vacancy rates on the rise

Do you expect your vacancy rate to increase, decrease or stay the same in the next two years?




Security, project managers top needs


CIOs focus on specialty positions


Big projects used to lure prospects

Do you expect the rate of retirements among IT specialists at your agency to increase, decrease or stay the same in the next three to five years?




Half contract 30 percent of jobs

What percentage of IT jobs at your agency is contracted out to industry?




Increasing workload spurs contracting
